Activity- "Awareness about Gender based Violence (GBV) & Law for Justice in India"

- ➤ Work to change attitudes, or questioning gender roles and stereotypes that make gender-based violence acceptable in society.
- ➤ Providing accessible information about what gender-based violence is, about its different forms, possible remedies and existing support measures.
- > Training professionals to be able to identify, address and respond to gender-based violence.
- > Revealing the scale of the problem: gender-based violence is rarely discussed, and data at a local or regional level is often not available, or is incomplete.
- Awareness raising campaigns and policies to address gender inequality and genderbased violence can also help to raise the importance of the problem in the public eye.

Empowerment programmes which strengthen the self-esteem and autonomy of those sections of the population which are more likely to be at risk of violence are necessary. Furthering gender equality and human rights education for everyone. So, this activity was crucial.
